1. CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 5:13pm.

2. ADOPTION OF MINUTES

The minutes from the May 24, 2023, meeting were unanimously approved as submitted.

3. CITIZENS REPORT

No report from citizens

4. COUNCIL LIAISON REPORT

Councilor McFall updated the Board on recent Council topics including:

- Centerra South project was approved.
- A new pay plan was adopted for City employees.
- 6th and Douglas rezoning put on hold.
- Ballot issue that would allow citizens to vote to keep or remove sales tax on food – could be a 9 million dollar hit to the general fund.
- Ballot issue that would allow citizens to vote to approve or deny URA requests.
- Long term plans for housing for the homeless; dealing with residual effects
 of services for the homeless being in downtown Loveland, i.e., granting
 the police more leeway in dealing with this issue.
- LFRA wants to ask the voters for a new tax to help the Fire Department pay for equipment, etc.

5. ACTION OR DISCUSSION ITEMS

Youth Board Member

Mark Esoda reviewed the information in the packet regarding the proposal of adding youth members to all the boards and commissions and asked for the Board's feedback based on questions from the City Clerk. The Board feels that:

- Youth board member must be a high school student under 21 and a golfer.
- Youth member must be business minded.
- Youth member needs to be held to same standard as all other Board members regarding attendance. Especially, if they want to vote.
- Youth member should be brought on the summer prior to the full year of school. A graduating senior won't work due to Golf season.
- Youth member must be able to handle contentious discussions.

6. NON-ACTION OR INFORMATIONAL ITEMS

2024 Fees and Policies

Andrea Sheldon presented agenda packet information reviewing the decisions made by the Board in May regarding fees and policies. Staff has heard from Private cart owners and other players who have expressed their concerns with the sunsetting of this program in 2030. A lengthy discussion ensued reviewing the decisions made in May and revisiting several issues including:

- Per use fees for authorized users and guest riders.
- Grandfathering existing owners with no new cart owners for the time being.
- Sunsetting the use of private carts in 2030

The Board followed this conversation with a review of other fees and policies passed in May including:

- Discussion of twilight times.
- Grandfathering the sale of full week passes to current passholders.
- 5% increase on initial pass price.
- No increase to seasonal pass per rounds user fees
- No increase to daily fees
- Increase to Cattail Creek cart rental rates.

The general consensus of the Board was to go forward with the fees as approved at the May meeting and hold a public information meeting in conjunction with the August meeting to discuss fee/program changes and solicit feedback. All private cart owners will be specifically invited to attend.

The Olde Course at Loveland Historical Signage

Andrea Sheldon introduced the topic of the historical sign at The Olde Course at Loveland. The contents of the sign will include historical perspectives of the development of the course and include contributions made by Don Fox and others. The sign will cost around \$1,000 and will be an 18x24 sign encased in a steel case stand. Andrea is currently working on making sure proper credit is given for the photos and drawings. Will Parker shared that he had spoken to a member of the committee that suggested a tribute to Don Fox and they were pleased with the sign and its contents.

7. STAFF REPORTS

Golf Manager Report: Mark reported on the following items:

• The new cart fleet arrived at the courses; the seats of the carts seem to retain

- heat from the sun more than the old seats.
- The contracts for the roof replacement of the Mariana Butte maintenance building and design services for the Mariana Butte range tee project at Mariana Butte are complete. Bid documents for the MBGC tee renovation are in the works.
- The #1 tee at Cattail is open again.
- No shows are down to 9%.
- 13,000 range balls have been lost since August; 1 letter has been sent.
- The sculpture at The Olde Course will be installed in September.
- Smaller projects include:
 - Music, monitors, and floors at Cattail.
 - o The repaving of the upper parking lot at Mariana Butte August 21-25th.
 - Aerification dates set: Mariana Butte, Aug 21st, The Olde Course is Sep. 11th, and Cattail is Sep. 18th.

Financial Report: Andrea provided a brief financial report. Year over year expenses are tracking higher than 2022, but so are revenues.

8. BOARD MEMBER COMMENTS

- Chuck Weirauch believes we would bring in more revenue by alternating 9and 10-minute interval tee times.
- Beth Soderquist expressed concerned for the path on the hill between the upper and lower parking lots at Mariana Butte. She feels that a hand rail should be placed along the path.
- **9. ADJOURN-** There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 6:40PM.

1 CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order by Chair, Beth Soderquist at 4:15 PM.

2 ACTION OR DISCUSSION ITEMS

 Review of Golf Information Meeting information: Decisions for 2024 Fee Package

Beth Soderquist began the meeting by reviewing the outcomes of the Golfer Information meeting held on 08/23/23 and opened the floor for discussion. A lengthy dialogue ensued during which feedback received via email, in-person interactions, or through other communication channels, was related and reviewed and the following areas were considered at length:

- Increasing all golf green fees (including user fees) by \$0.50 and not increasing private cart fees
- •
- Basing future fee increases on the Consumer Price Index
- Reviewing the fiscal objectives of fee increases; how much does the fund need and how should that amount be achieved.
- Decreasing the tee time interval from 10 minutes to 9 minutes (or less) to achieve increased green fee revenues instead of raising revenue via private cart fees.
- Improvement opportunities for communication surrounding proposed fee increases.
- Pros and cons of sunsetting the private cart program.
- Responsibility of the Board to make business-minded decisions.
 Eventually, a solution must be implemented, the program cannot continue as is.
- Fairness of raising golf green fees to cover private carts, the daily green fee market and the effect that may have on the daily fee player.
- Is labeling the private cart program as being subsidized correct or is it a pricing category.

- Costs of private carts to the City. Is there a cost, or is it lost revenue opportunities.
- Sunsetting or not sunsetting the program.
- Offering or not offering new contracts

Nate Thoreson joined the meeting at 5:15PM

Kara Kish related information to the Board about subsidization: The golf courses are municipal assets. Traditionally, in recreation program cost recovery, pricing decisions take into account the balance between the benefit an individual user receives and the broader benefit to the community. Some activities or classes may have a higher individual benefit, such as specialized sports instruction, while others may have a more significant community-wide benefit. Classes with higher individual benefit are usually priced to be cost-plus. The revenue generated from cost-plus classes can help subsidize the costs of other classes that provide more a of community benefit. The private carts program is a program with high individual benefit.

Councilor McFall offered that reviewing of the objectives of fee increases was reasonable. Raising the rates on all golfers so private cart owners don't have to pay more would not seem to be a likely objective.

Action: After careful consideration and deliberation by the Board, Blake Nicholson made the motion to modify the initially proposed 2024 proposed private cart rates and policies as follows:

YEARLY TRAIL PERMITS

- The Olde Course at Loveland/Cattail Creek = \$496.00
- Mariana Bute = \$814.00

Per Round Rider Fees

- No per round rider fee for the owner(s) of the cart. Guest riders of authorized operators required to pay rider fee. Members of authorized operator household exempt.
- Guest Rider Fees
- o \$5.00/9 holes
- o \$10.0/18 holes

PER ROUND/USE PRIVATE CART PERMIT

2024 Fees

\$25.00 Yearly Cart Registration Fee

Per Round Rider Fees

 FIRST SEAT |Guest riders of authorized operators required to pay rider fee. Members of authorized operator household exempt o \$12.00 9 Holes

Future increases to the "first seat" price will be tied to the daily fee rental rate.

Policy Changes

- Existing private cart contracts will be renewed for 2024 and beyond. No new cart contracts will be issued in 2024.
- The decision to sunset private cart in 2030 will not be implemented for 2024

It was seconded by Denise Rhoades and passed with unanimous approval.


